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20 Years, 1000 Dances, Too Many Smiles to Count



20 Years, 1000 Dances, Too Many Smiles to Count

The NEFFA Thursday night contra dance is celebrating its 1000th dance on Thursday November 11th with a free dance for all attendees that night. NEFFA News Editor Dan Pearl interviewed Thursday Night Dance Committee Chair Dan Pearl about the last 20 years.

News: Hi, Dan. Thanks for taking the time to talk with me about the Thursday night series.

Dan: No problem, Dan. My time is your time.

News: Indeed. So how did it come that NEFFA is running the Thursday Night Dance?

Dan: It was the spring of 1990. There were rumors that Tod Whittemore, the creator and proprietor of the Thursday dance, was going to close the dance down. We couldn't believe it. Tod had been running the dance since the late 1970's, initially at the Cambridge YWCA, and then at the Mt. Auburn VFW on Huron Avenue. Tod was talented. funny, charismatic, and casual – sort of like the Hugh Hefner of the contra dance world – and he filled the place week after week. It was simply the "place to be".

News: So what happened?

Dan: At the end of his run, Tod

was running out of energy and motivation. Tod's ambivalence towards the series was picked up by the dancers, who responded in kind by staying home. It was sad, but Tod announced the end of the series in his newsletter, "At the Hop". I became part of a small group who would huddle after dances with designs on keeping the dance going. Besides me, there was Steve Boylan, Cal Howard, Larry Jennings, Leslie Morrison, John Rowen, and Ernie Spence. We met one evening at the Yenching restaurant in Harvard Square. Over Kung Pao Whatever, we hammered out our vision of what the dance should be.

Should there be a beginner workshop? Regular performers

in rotation? Varied performers? These questions, and many more, needed to be answered. By the time the last fortune cookie was opened ("You will run a successful dance series"), the Thursday dance, as we know it today, had been born.

News: You're joking about the fortune, right? Dan: Duh! Unlike Tod's dance, which was a Whittemore Family Production, we saw benefit to running the dance under the auspices of a non-profit organization. Larry, Leslie and I already had connections to NEFFA, so we approached them about making the dance a NEFFA event. The NEFFA Executive Committee agreed, and the TNDC (Thursday Night Dance Committee) was formed, with me as Chair.

News: Who is on the committee, now?

Dan: Besides me, Cal and Ernie are the only original members still on the committee. Ernie hasn't been to our dances for some time because of health, but it gives me a good feeling to have him remain on our roster. We miss him. Our other members are Lisa

Greenleaf (who expertly handles the booking of

Contra multi-caller evenings), Nell Wright, "Mac" Walker, and Tova Cohen. We have meetings once every year or two. The dance sort of runs itself.

News: So why did you leave the VFW?

Dan: We had to. The VFW hall was an expensive building to maintain. The dues income from the evershrinking VFW membership plus the rental income and bar revenue was not enough to cover the overhead. The VFW finally relented to sell their property — lock, stock and rocket — to the City of Cambridge for a very tidy sum. The deal was even sweeter for the VFW, because they now rent their new basement facility at the same address for a buck-a-year type of arrangement.

The city's plans were to knock down the hall, and put in facilities for the youth center that they planned for the site. We needed to get out, and that's what we did. While the Scout House was offering us a slot, we felt compelled to first try another in-town location: Springstep.

News: Ah, yes. Springstep.

Dan: Springstep. That situation didn't work out well for us, and we wound up losing thousands of dollars in our 6-month stint there.

Fortunately, Thursdays were open at the Scout House, so we made the move to Concord.

News: And you've been there ever since.

Dan: For the most part. Occasionally, the Scout House does floor refinishing and we need to move the dance for a week. We have used Arlington Town Hall, the West Cambridge Youth and Community Center (WYACC), and the FOPAC hall across Walden St. from the Scout House. On November 4th, we are running the dance at the WYACC in Cambridge..

News: Tell me about the Boat Dance.

Dan: I *loved* the Boat Dance. This was a Tod tradition that we tried a few times. We'd rent a three-deck tour boat and tool around Boston Harbor. We'd visit the USS Constitution while we were dancing "Hull's Victory".

News: Why did you stop running them?

Dan: Let me tell you: A tour boat is one expensive hall. Last time we rented it, it was \$800 an hour for the proverbial "three-hour tour". Do the math. We lost a ton of money, and called it quits. Maybe we'll try it again some day.

News: How has the dance changed in 20 years?

Dan: The age demographics change over time. Nowadays, it seems like over a third of the crowd is younger than 22. This bodes well for a healthy future of our dance series. We know that the soul of our dance is within the dancers. We are going to our part by putting on the best dance we can, and we hope that lots of folks will go along for the ride.

NEFFA is a non-profit organization run by volunteers. In addition to producing an annual Folk Festival, NEFFA runs a weekly contra dance, the Ralph Page Dance Legacy Weekend, and a series of family dances. NEFFA has also supported various folk-related activities through its grants program.

Our traditions and bylaws encourage member participation in a number of ways. One of these is by volunteering at the Festival. Another significant way that interested individuals can participate is by becoming a Board Member. NEFFA's goals of preserving folk traditions are overseen by an Executive Board, composed of elected and appointed members. Under NEFFA's bylaws, elected Directors, or Members of the Board, are expected to chair or serve as a member of a committee or to take on another responsibility.

Each year, the Nominating Committee prepares a ballot listing the nominees for the open positions on the Board. We welcome all **suggestions** and volunteers from the NEFFA membership. Our bylaws also encourage **direct nomination** by members: the name of any eligible person suggested by twenty-five or more members will be included on the ballot, if he or she consents.

The current Elected Board members are listed below. Those positions marked with a dot (·) are to be filled in the April election. Directors and officers serve terms of two years and may be reelected for one additional term (the Secretary and the Treasurer are always eligible for re-election). Members of the Nominating Committee serve for a single three-year term.
